Years later, after participating in thousands of competitions both within and outside academia, I realized that academic positions were the best option in terms of freedom, income, and opportunities for discovery.

Did you have an inspiring model that motivated you to follow this career path?

I had many inspiring role models. As a child, they were mostly men—writers, thinkers, heroes. But later, my actual life became filled with strong, self-confident, and stubborn—yet often lonely—women. Some of my teachers pursued research purely for the pleasure of knowledge. The women in my family—my mother, my grandmothers—managed everything on their own, constantly negotiating their space within the historical expectations of femininity and family, sometimes succumbing to them.

And of course, there were scientists who not only embodied the creativity of scientific thinking but also championed free thought in personal, political, and social life. Who wouldn't be inspired by Marie Curie's persistence, combined with her honesty about the complex entanglement of a woman's mind with her desires, passions, roles, inspirations?

What are you most proud of so far in your work as a researcher?

People I've met – friends, colleagues, students – who have decided to share part of their story with me and told me that it has changed their lives. Did you meet any barriers during your career as a researcher? Do you attribute any of them to the fact you are a woman in your field?

Compared to other working contexts, academia is populated by educated people, relationships are often formal but correct, there is in general propensity toward progressiste trends, including about gender. Nevertheless, I can say that being a women makes things a bit more complicated for the following reasons: you are as good as a man, but often less bold and self-confident and this automatically shadows your competences.

You are attentive to relationships sometimes in a such a strong manner that in order not to harm anybody's sensitivity, you prefer to shut up in order to maintain good relationships (this might be just my case); getting older, your life is often crowded with duties toward relatives, less time, and competition still very high. This also happens for men but women, including in cooperative contexts, keep on taking most of the organisational burden on themselves; being accomodating, smiling and entusiastic often results in others taking advantage of it - it takes ages to become so strong, refuse the feminine stereotypes, and affirm your willingness (not merely in academia).

How would you describe the state of gender equity in your field, and have you experienced the implementation of any gender equality policies?

I haven't personally experienced the explicit implementation of gender equality policies, but in my experience I haven't seen discrimination due to existing career or recruitment policies.

What would you suggest for a better implementation of gender equality in your field of work?

In general, I think that the possibility to work remotely, a more result-oriented working attitude, straightforward communication and a drastic reduction of bureaucracy would be largely beneficial. Not merely for women.

Being passionate and smiling, caring and attentive should never impede you to affirm your willingness and pursue your view, whatever it takes.
